No to Trident RenewalPublic Meeting in Wells



Both Tessa Munt M.P. (centre) and Professor David Webb, Chair National CND (right) gave excellent talks, to a small meeting in Wells on Saturday 23rd March. Tessa stressed that we need to make the renewal of Trident a major issue for the next General Election. David reported that public opinion was now against the renewal and considered it not only unaffordable in a recession, but also in-effective in the modern world. It did not prevent any of the recent acts of terror and protects us from no-one. It solely benefits the arms companies who make the bombs. He also in response to question, said that jobs would not be lost by its cancellation, the skilled workforce could readily be employed if government instead invested in the alternative energy industry.

All agreed that the challenge was to convert this political support into action, specifically to win the Labour Party to join the Lib Dem and Green MPs in voting down the proposal to renew Trident. Interestingly both Dave and Tessa indicated that privately several Tory MPs are also opposed to the renewal.

Bruce Kent's "Rant in Wells"



As part of his national speaking tour "Time to Scrap Trident: - Stop fooling with nuclear weapons" Bruce Kent Vice-President CND visited Wells on Thursday 4th May. No one else has his capacity to draw a crowd on a quiet lunchtime. Over 25 stopped to listen to his "rant" (his word) on stopping Trident. Future Events to mark Hiroshima August 3rd & 6th

Saturday August 3rd:

We have permission from the Dean of the Cathedral to again have a CND Stall on Wells Cathedral Green. We aim to be there 11am until 3pm. Please come and support us.



Tuesday August 6th,

We are hosting from 11.30am an art exhibition in Wells Museum on the experiences of children living through the Fukushima nuclear accident by the artist Geoff Read. His work as a co-artist gives children experiencing difficult circumstances, ways of expressing and communicating their thinking and feeling to a wider audience. At the time the triple disaster of 11th March 2011 struck, Geoff had been living in Fukushima with his 8-year-old son for two years. Strong Children is a continuing collaborative art project.

In conjunction with the exhibition we will be organising on the Cathedral green (and in the Museum if the weather is bad) an origami workshop to make peace cranes and boats along with brush painting.

In the evening there will be a reception in the Wells Museum at 7.30 pm to hear a Geoff Read talk about his work and experiences in Fukushima. Following the reception we aim to float 68 origami boats on Bishops Palace moat to commemorate the 68 years since the first atomic explosion Hiroshima in 1945.
